The festival of Holi has just passed bringing in the spring season and the temperature has started rising. The spring brings blooming flowers and flower shows around Delhi.

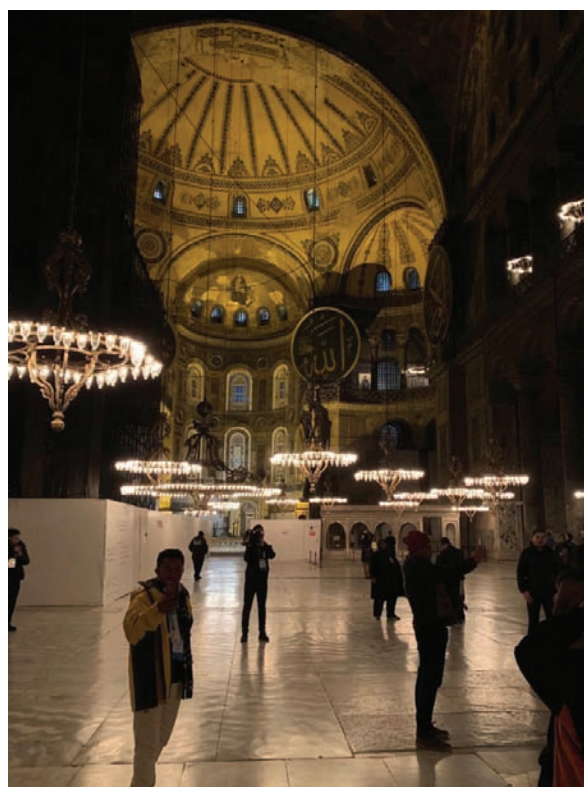
March was a lean month in bringing new books as the new financial year starts from April.

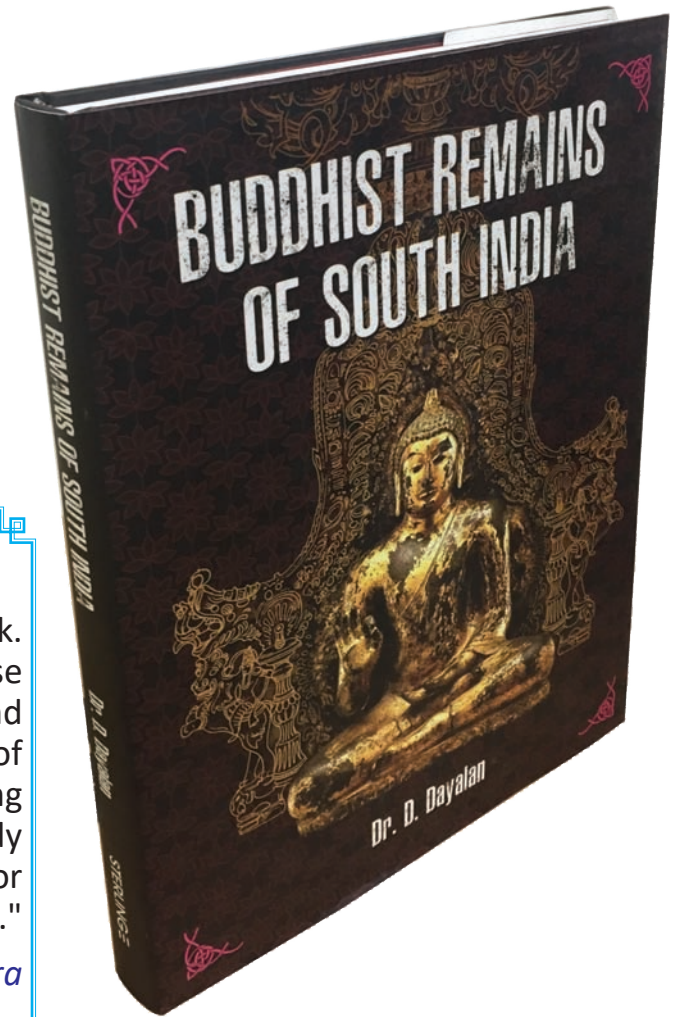

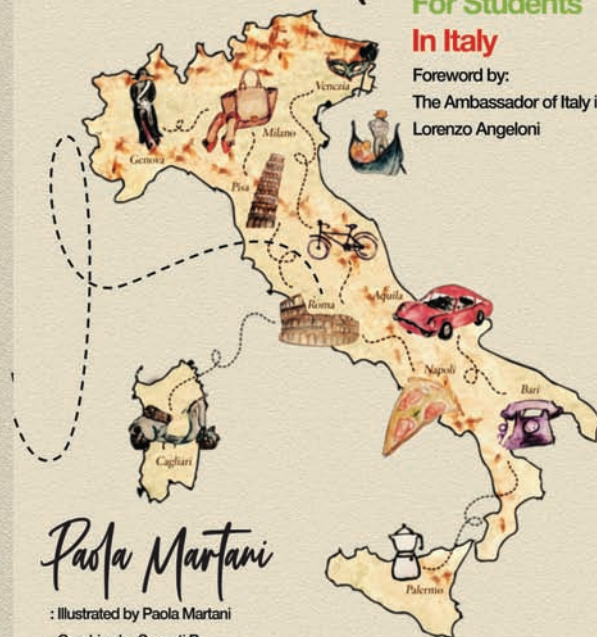

### About the author

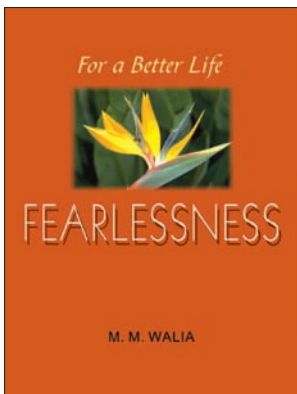
Paola Martani holds the academic title of 'dottore in philosophy' from Università degli Studi di Milano, as well as an MPhil in Linguistics.

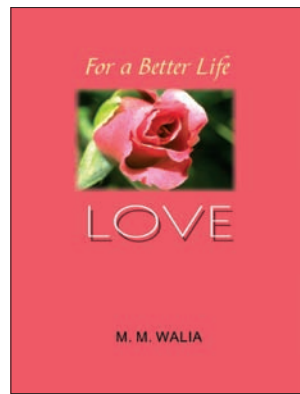
In April 2018, she was awarded for her work by the Women Economic Forum. She also writes a bi-monthly column, Culture and Influence, in *AsiaOne*.

# EIGHT BEAUTIFUL REMINDERS FOR A BETTER LIFE

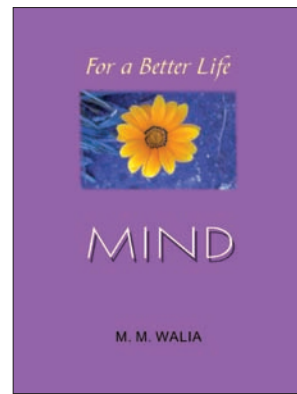
1. ***Nothing Is Permanent - Don't stress yourself too much because no matter how bad the situation is, it will change.***

8. ***The world is full of nice people. If you can't find one, be one.***



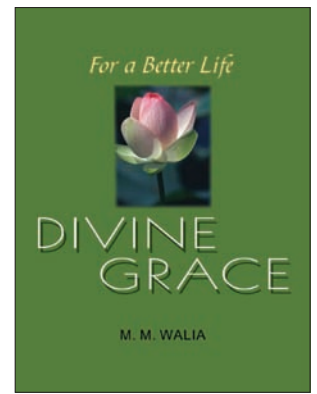
